Proposed Budget Empowers All

The Lake George Central School District Board of Education is proposing a budget of \$24,367,652 for the 2022-23 school year. This is an overall budget-to-budget increase of \$457,903. The proposed tax levy is just below the district's maximum allowable tax levy cap of 2.52%.

School administrators have worked hard to craft a budget and teaching/learning plan that empowers students and promotes lifelong learning and leading. An integral part of the budget development process entails shaping educational experiences to coincide with student needs and available resources.

The 2022-23 budget is the result of successful long-range planning. Years ago, the district implemented systems to keep programs sustainable while avoiding large fluctuations in the budget. For instance, the Instructional Technology Plan that is required by NYS every three years is the backbone of the district's technology replacement program. It ensures that student and teacher devices are up-to-date with technology and educational best practices while staying within budget. Similarly, the district has an ongoing bus replacement program in which school buses are retired at the end of 10-years after their warranties expire. This saves on costly repairs and maintenance while keeping expenses predictable.

Last year, the district worked closely with the faculty association to offer a two-year retirement incentive. This incentive allowed employees and the district to plan in a mutually respectful way.

"We have a clear picture of our enrollment and staffing needs," said Lake George CSD Interim Superintendent Doug Huntley. "The retirement incentive enabled the district to take a broad look at the academic and co-curricular offerings and plan for innovative and expanded opportunities for students using essentially the same dollars."

A total of 10 staff members retired at the end of the 2020-21 school year, and the district replaced five of those positions. An additional 13 staff members plan to retire at the end of the 2021-22 school year; 10 of these positions will be replaced.

The principals, curriculum coordinators, and faculty members have been thoughtfully planning resource allocation, from staffing to learning spaces and more. They are maximizing our talented staff members in a way that results in more personalized learning opportunities for students. At the Jr.-Sr. High School, this will mean two additional Advanced Placement courses in government and chemistry and continued support of an AP studio art program. At the Elementary School, reimagining learning spaces and increasing opportunities for small-group instruction are just two of a number of initiatives being addressed.

Included in the regular budget is a \$100,000 "capital outlay" project that does not require special approval from voters. NYS Education Law allows school districts to conduct one capital outlay project annually, which will be reimbursed at the district's

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building aid ratio in the form of NYS Building Aid the following fiscal year. The 2022-23 capital outlay project will improve indoor air quality and ventilation in the Jr.-Sr. High School. It coincides with the HVAC project the district is already undertaking using additional federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) and Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds the district will receive to respond to the pandemic.

Election of Three BOE Members

Residents will vote to elect three members to the Board of Education. Each seat is a three-year term that begins on July 1, 2022. The seats are currently held by Lin King, Maryanne MacKenzie, and Melissa Seale, whose terms expire on June 30, 2022.

Board members are elected at large; the three people receiving the highest number of votes will be declared elected to the Board of Education for full 3-year terms.

Propositions

2022-23 School Budget

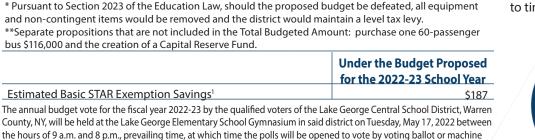
RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Lake George Central School District, Town of Lake George, County of Warren, be and hereby is authorized to expend the sum of \$24,367,652 during the 2022-23 school year and to levy the necessary tax therefore.

Proposition 1: Bus Purchase

RESOLVED that the Board of Education of the Lake George Central School District is hereby authorized to: 1) acquire one (1) 60-passenger bus at a maximum aggregate cost of not to exceed \$116,000; 2) expend such sum for such purpose; 3) levy the necessary tax therefore, to be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education taking into account state aid; and 4) in anticipation of the collection of such tax, issue bonds and notes of the District and/or enter into installment purchase agreements at one time or from time to time in the principal amount not to exceed \$116,000, and levy a tax to pay the interest on said obligations when due.

Proposition 2: Establish a Capital Reserve Fund

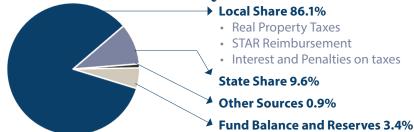
RESOLVED that the Board of Education of the Lake George Central School District is hereby authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000, with a probable term of ten (10) years, for the purpose of financing the construction of school buildings and facilities, construction of additions to and reconstruction of school buildings and facilities, acquisition of land, site work and acquisition of original furnishings, equipment, machinery or apparatus, with such Capital Reserve Fund being funded with such portion of the unallocated fund balance as may be determined from time to time by the Board of Education.

Voters must be: United States citizens, 18 years of age or older and district residents for 30 days prior to the vote. A resident can only have one legal residence, which is his or her place of permanent residence.

Planning for the Future

Residents of the Lake George Central School District will be asked to consider the creation of a Capital Reserve Fund when they vote for the 2022-23 school budget. Capital Reserve Funds are used by school districts for the purpose of saving money for future Capital Projects.

The proposed Capital Reserve Fund would be funded by portions of the unallocated fund balance fund as determined by the Board of Education. The proposed Capital Reserve Fund would be capped at \$10 million with a probable duration of 10 years. It would be used to offset the local share of future Capital Project(s), which would require voter approval to undertake.

The most recent Capital Reserve Fund for Lake George CSD was established in 2016. \$1,605,282 of the money collected in that fund, which was capped at \$2.5 million for 10 years, was used for the local share of the Capital Project that voters approved in December 2018. The remaining \$894,718 will be used toward a future Capital Project.

All Capital Projects are based on the district's Building Condition Survey (BCS), which is required by NYS to be completed every five years. Lake George CSD's most recent BCS was completed in 2021 and can be found on the district website. While the majority of the district received a Satisfactory rating, there are areas that were rated Unsatisfactory, such as the bus garage, that will need to be addressed.

"Undertaking Capital Projects on a regular basis helps the district maintain a tax levy that is stable and predictable while keeping our buildings and grounds in optimal condition," said Lake George CSD Interim Superintendent Doug Huntley.
